Hubbell Archives

The grand opening of the Hubbell Archives and Oral History Museum at the HTPNHS occurred Monday, August 30. While the red ribbon fluttered in the breeze an enthusiastic group toured the archives, which are housed in a steel building with lots of space saver shelving. The Winslow collection of papers, the Hubbell original rugs, and many other artifacts are carefully cataloged and available. The oral histories collected over many years are translated and transcribed into English and made easy with a detailed finding aid for the convenience of the researcher. The Hubbell Trading Post along with the National Historic Site have opened a 5500 square foot Archives and Oral History center housing 66,000 artifacts. The design of the storage area is divided into three rooms, one for archives, another for wagon storage, and lastly a room for everything else.

In addition there are two offices, a research lab, and an archival supply storage room. The \$900,000 cost of the facility included everything from preliminary field archeological surveys, architectural design, construction, and the compact storage system.

Dinner Party!

The Hubbell House Alliance and Bernalillo County will be hosting a dinner for the Hubbell Family Historical Society, a Genealogical Society for all the descendants of Richard Hubbell, the initial 1606 immigrant ancestor, at the house on June 30, 2005. This is the 12th Biennial Reunion of HFHS. Other events include a Special Overnight Field Trip to the Four Corners Area with a gathering at the Trading Post with many of the Navajo and Hopi Hubbell descendants. Visits to several of the former trading posts of Juan Lorenzo Hubbell who was born in our Parajito home in the 1860's. The regular meeting of the HFHS includes governance activities as well as many sessions of interest. The sessions include topics like, Genealogy 101, How to read the Hubbell Genealogy, Highlights from *Hubbells by Choice*, The First 100 Years of Hubbell's in America: A Historical Family Overview, Growing up a Hubbell in New Mexico, Westward Ho! Tracing the Migration of the Pioneer Hubbells, Hubbells in Science. The meeting is open to all. The Indio-Hispano Academy of Agricultural Arts and Sciences (IHAAAS) have had a fairly successful growing season. It has planted chili on the Hubbell Property and vegetables on other Bernalillo County Open Space Properties. Its youth participants have been selling produce on Saturdays at the local Grower's Markets and providing WIC families with fresh fruits and vegetables.

Agriculture Committee Report



Future plans for the Hubbell House property are to develop an Heirloom Orchard and plant grapevines that have been an integral part of the property since the 1780's.

When the Spanish Missionaries came to New Mexico they brought with them European grapes that really were not that adapted to New Mexico and they had to learn how to protect them from winter damage. One grape, the Mission Grape, did survive and can still be found growing in the valley areas. The bunches are loose and they do not ripen evenly, but the flavor is excellent. We have started some cuttings and will continue to make cuttings next spring to plant on the property.

In the late 1890's records indicate that the Hubbell property had over 1000 fruit trees planted. The records indicate that there were at least 30 apple varieties planted. We anticipate planting some of these same varieties in the Orchard next spring. The varieties planted in the 1890s include: Twenty Ounce, Gentian, Early Harvest, Ben Davis, Golden Pippin, Wine sap, and Rhode Island Greening.

In addition we will be looking at heirloom fruit trees that are grown in New Mexico. There are several fruit trees that are estimated to be over 100 years old. The committee will evaluate these trees to include in the orchard.

A note of interest, in the near by Manzano mountains, near Albuquerque, there is a small town called "Manzano", which means "apple" in Spanish. The Franciscan priests built a small mission there in about 1629 and planted an apple orchard. The church has since disappeared but the orchard remained. It was said that some of the trees were planted in 1659 and survived until 1939. At that time, we are told, an over zealous person decided to fertilize the neglected old trees and unfortunately killed most of them. In 1962 it was reported that there were still some 20 trees that were quite old in the orchard and were known only as Mexican Apples. These apples had a yellow skin and were sweet and stored well.

Members of the Hubbell House Alliance have traveled to the Agricultural Experiment Station in Alcalde, New Mexico to see their organic orchard experiments. A clover that is being tested at the Station shows promise in providing natural nitrogen for tree growth. We anticipate planting New Zealand Dwarf White Clover in our orchard as well.

Lawrence Lane's grandmother, Julie Hubbell was born at the Hubbell House. He spent 10 years in Europe working in the French Army before going to San Francisco, California, where he was a restaurant management consultant. He returned to New Mexico a year ago and has been working for the president of the NM State Senate.

Steve Lane, 37, is 4th generation Hubbell. His Great-grand father, J. Felipe Hubbell was raised at the Hubbell House. Steve has fond childhood memories of many Christmas Eves spent at the house visiting his great-Aunt Louisa.

Steve holds a BA from N.M.S.U (Government and Journalism).

After college he was an Event Coordinator with the N.M. State Fair and a Food and Beverage Manager with two successful Albuquerque restaurants. More recently Steve was the Aquatic /Sports Director with the YMCA of Albuquerque. Currently he is a property manager with Keith Properties.

Steve wishes to contribute his diverse management background assisting with the development of events, programming and fundraising. He recognizes the Hubbell House as a historical, cultural and educational asset as well as the heritage of the South Valley.

Did You Know?

Sydney Hubbell, the brother of J. L. "Santiago" Hubbell was appointed by President Lincoln to serve as a judge to the 3rd Judicial District in Las Vegas NM, and served two terms until 1867. Born in Salisbury Connecticut in 1826 he arrived in New Mexico in 1849. He died on April 2, 1880 and is buried in the Mason's Cemetery in Las Vegas, New Mexico. Sydney Hubbell was also a co-owner to the Juanita Mining Claim in the Magdalena District. which produced ore at 60% silver.

Adobe Workshop

The volunteer day and adobe workshops have been very successful! They are a great chance to learn the traditional craft of adobe construction as it was practiced in the 1800's. The most recent get-together was held August 28th. The Alliance relies on volunteers for much of the work needed to complete the construction phase before the Hubbell House can begin its new life as a community resource. The work at hand is to build up the exterior walls of the southwest rooms.

To complete one wall involves several steps: Using a mud mixture, several layers are applied to the wall to fill the holes and level the wall. The final layer is smooth and flat. The dirt must first be shoveled through a screen to get a uniform size, and then is mixed with water, sand, and straw to compose a mortar, which is spread on the wall using a trowel. The exact formula and trowel method are two of the skills you can learn and perfect by attending these terrific workshops. There are experts from the Santa Fe's non-profit -Cornerstones and the Bernalillo County Parks and Recreation Dept. to teach and assist volunteers. These are not just academics; we roll up our sleeves and get our hands dirty.

At the July and August events we were able to finish most of the walls as well as start the re-framing of some windows. **The next scheduled workshops are September 25th and October 23. The day begins at 8:30am but you may join us anytime.** We will provide a lunch but please bring gloves, hat, sunscreen and extra water. Gutierrez - Hubbell House Docent Program

Now that work is progressing on the restoration of the Gutierrez-Hubbell House we need to start training for a docent program so we can give tours of the house and property when it is ready. We are now looking for members who would like to become docents.

First - what is docent? The word comes from the Latin verb “docere” which means to teach and in this case to work with small tour groups of children (school classes, scouts, 4-H, etc.) and adult groups who want to learn about the historic Hubbell property.

Second – what would becoming a docent involve? It would mean attending 8 to 10 two hour sessions where you will receive material and training from experts on subjects such as Parajito history, agricultural background of the property, organic gardening, history of the house, information on the Gutierrez – Hubbell family, adobe construction, environmental information, and learn how to present what you have learned to the different kinds of groups who come to visit. After the main training sessions there will need to be one docent session a month to keep up with what is happening. It could also occasionally include field trips.

Third – when you finish the main training sessions, you will be needed at events held at the property to tour groups and answer questions. Later there will be school classes and adult groups who will schedule tours.

Being a docent and sharing what you learn can be a very enjoyable experience. If this is something you might be interested in doing, or want more information about, please contact:
